We observed World Leprosy Day at the end of January, and throughout February, people returned their Gift Envelopes for the work of Leprosy Mission Scotland. On the last Sunday of the month, the donations were counted and the total was an excellent £971.19. The figure last year was £948.14, which makes this year's gift all the more impressive. Add on to that the fact that 24 donations were Gift Aided, which means yet more money for this so vital work.

And along with the special focus on World Leprosy Day, members of the Congregation support the Leprosy Mission regularly all through the year, by using the small blue tubs, which are taken away and returned on any Sunday morning. My records show that from February 2019 till February 2020, the blue tubs yielded a wonderful £802.86.

this year is being devoted to a project in Sri Lanka, called the Women's Development Centre (WDC).


This began in 1986 in the garage at the Scots Kirk in the city of Kandy, when a visionary woman called Pearl Stephen, the minister's wife, set up a school for disabled children. Over the years, this has developed into a Centre now best known for its work with the victims of sexual violence.

Pearl died in 2013 and the Centre's work is continuing under the leadership of her daughter-in-law, Sashi. WDC can accommodate 50 girls and young women under the age of 16 who have been raped and abused. Sashi and her team care for girls who are vulnerable and often discarded by their families. Every penny raised by the Stamp Appeal will go towards supporting these young women who have been through so much, helping to give them hope for the future.

It is with sadness I acknowledge the Coronavirus and the impact it is having on all our lives; however, it is with immense

gratitude I acknowledge the many blessings in my life and the many that God continues to bring in these challenging times.

Unfortunately, at the moment life is hard and different to what we hoped and planned and therefore Messy Church, The Family Film Evening and the Easter Holiday Club have been postponed until the current situation improves. However, we should not be despondent, we have faith in the God who does and will continue to answer our prayers and bless each and every one of us. As I write I am thankful for so much in my life - the sunshine, my family, for friends, for food, for health, for kindnesses and for a peace in my heart. As you read this think of the things for which you are grateful and as you do this thank God for every blessing. I encourage you to do this daily and feel the benefit.

On a practical note it is worth stating:

We haven't cancelled worship; what we have done is cancel a religious service at a specific time, in a specific place, on a specific day, but folks can still worship God where they are and when they are caring for grandchildren and walking their dogs; they can worship Jesus as they serve at foodbanks or

picking up groceries for a neighbour; worship when they share the Spirit's peace by having a chat or singing songs over the phone to a parent; worship when they work from home; worship when they endure extra shifts in hospitals or nursing homes; worship when they email someone far away and wave to a stranger across the street; worship when they take toilet paper to a homeless shelter and volunteer to help someone.

We haven't cancelled worship, just the "official" part but that may be the smallest part of it all anyway.

In everything we do we worship God and this I am confident will continue. EKOPC has amazing people who will rally together and demonstrate their love for God in their acts of kindness for others.

We have set up a group to respond to any assistance or support which may be required by any member of the congregation over the coming weeks and months due to the current coronavirus outbreak. The group is offering

through, practical and/or pastoral support, any of the following :- collect prescriptions, go for shopping, dog-walking, deliver mail, chat on the phone and/or Skype or Facetime or similar.

You may not need to access any of the services on offer immediately but may need to do so as time goes on and this service will be available until the current situation improves and we are back to normal.

To request the services of the group the following channels are available for your use - via your church elder, through the church Facebook page, email the church office (ekopc.office@btconnect.com) or leave a message on the church phone in the office on 01355 279004. The office answer machine is monitored remotely so don't hesitate to leave messages.



For those with children here is some excellent advice for families while the schools are closed:

Please don't feel like you have to immediately start googling curriculums, learning resources and school work. This is going to be a worrying time for everyone, and our children and young people will be able to feel it as well.

Trying to force your children to learn rarely works and arguing and fighting with them to do so is likely to make an already stressful situation much worse.

Instead why not read to them, sing and dance with them play board games and chat.

They will learn that when something bad happens their parents played with them, distracted them and loved them. They will remember this as a time of fun, rather than a scary one.

Oh, and please remember to wash your hands whilst singing!!
