

PASTORAL LETTER

The date of Easter changes every year. To put it simply, Easter is the first Sunday after the full moon that occurs on or after the Spring equinox. If the full moon falls on a Sunday, then Easter is the following Sunday. Easter can be as early as 22nd March, or as late 25th April. This year it is on the early side on 31st March.

The timing of Lent is obviously dependent on the date for Easter, so this year Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on 14th February. Good luck in combining your Valentine's Day celebrations with your Ash Wednesday ones! Lent historically has been a time of self-reflection and preparation for Easter.

Everyone's Lenten journey is different and over the years, you and I might have taken on different approaches. While traditionally it has been seen as a time to "give up" certain things, often there is more value in "taking up" certain things. The important thing is that we see it as a time of self-reflection.

Elsewhere in this magazine you will find details of our Lenten study which is based on the novel/film "Chocolat." The premise is that a single mum called Vianne, arrives in a provincial town in France, and opens a chocolate shop during Lent. Horror! We'd love you to join us for it, but if you'd like to reflect on it at home, please get in touch with me and I can get some material to you for your own personal reflection.

Whatever you do in this Lenten Season, I wish you every blessing as we journey towards Holy Week and the glorious resurrection on Easter Sunday.

A SINGLE-MINDED MAN – WELLESLEY BAILEY

His name may not be familiar to most of us, but Wellesley Bailey is someone well worth knowing about. In the year 1874, in the front room of a house in Dublin, Wellesley Bailey, his wife Alice, and a handful of friends, met to hear Wellesley speak about people in India who suffered from the disease of leprosy. At the end of the gathering, the people present agreed to raise £30 per year to help care for leprosy affected people. This at a time when there was no cure for the disease. From that tiny beginning has grown the world-wide work of The Leprosy Mission today.

Wellesley was born in Ireland in 1846. As a young man, he sailed to India, intending to join his brother in the Indian Police. When he arrived, he discovered his brother was elsewhere and Wellesley was alone. He found lodgings with an elderly German Lutheran missionary who taught him Hindi.

His Christian faith grew and in the Punjab, while teaching in an American

Presbyterian school, he saw leprosy sufferers for the first time. That had a profound effect on him, and he felt God calling him personally to do something to help.


His child-hood sweet-heart, Alice, sailed to India to join him and they were married in the Cathedral in Bombay (now Mumbai) in 1870. Alice's health wasn't too good and they came back to Ireland. So it was that in that Dublin front room, 150 years ago this year, Wellesley Bailey launched the Mission to Lepers. In the 1880s, projects grew across India, including the first leprosy hospital in Purulia in West Bengal. It's still going strong.

In 1906, Wellesley and Alice travelled widely, visiting projects in China, New Zealand, Australia, the Philippines, Japan, Korea, Malaysia and Singapore. He retired aged 71 in 1917, with 87 projects in 12 countries, all caring for and helping people with leprosy.

Wellesley Bailey died in 1937 at the age of 91. His granddaughter wrote "He was not a saint, nor even a particularly clever man....but he was single-minded". The motivation to his single-mindedness was the love of God in Jesus Christ and his compassion for people with leprosy. The work goes on in ways that Wellesley Bailey never dreamt of, and a future article may outline some of these wonderful developments. But the motivation remains the same, and we do well when we support it strongly and gladly.

ANDREW PATTON

Andrew Patton was born on 25th May 1822 near Flodden, in the county of

Northumberland. His father was connected to the colliery where a young Andrew was sent to work.

After his marriage at Lammerton, Berwick-on-Tweed on 28th August 1844 to Mary Ann Bell, Andrew came north working at several collieries in Ayrshire, Renfrewshire and Lanarkshire. He was appointed manager of the Roman Cement Works where he spent the next twenty five years despite many tempting offers which he declined. He did not wish to leave the village as at least three of his infant children had died and were buried in the East Kilbride Parish Kirkyard.

Andrew found ample scope in East Kilbride to improve his knowledge of palaeontology. In the Kirktounholm mine he found two specimens of a very rare fossil fruit and at the workings at Glebe, Brousterland and Lymekilns a host of fragments of tree, fruit and gigantic water plants. In the Lymekilns workings he discovered a thin stratum composed of thin shells. He also found several hitherto undiscovered specimens of plants and animals of ancient seas he gathered from the debris, one of which was named Fissodus Pattonii.

Andrew became widely known as a collector and the museums of Glasgow, Edinburgh and London benefitted from his collection. He wrote a paper entitled "The Mineral Fields of East Kilbride."

In 1883, the Geological Society of Glasgow bestowed on him the honour of

corresponding member in recognition of his valuable service.

He was also involved in the social welfare of the people of East Kilbride and helped make its Co-operative Society efficient.

Andrew Patton died on the 23rd July 1885 leaving a widow and grown-up family.

His widow Mary Ann Bell died 20th April 1912, aged 90 years.

Their Children:

- Thomas Patton 19th February 1855 Blantyre 28th March 1894. He was a tailor and remained a bachelor.
- Margaret Ann Patton May 1846 -11th March 1857, Blantyre.
- Jane Patton January 1851 21st July 1861, East Kilbride.
- Henry Patton, stonemason, was born 22nd September 1861, at East Kilbride. He married in Manhattan, New York, on 18th March 1887 to Helen Barclay 16th January 1860 28th July 1890. Henry remarried on 15th November 1904 to Elizabeth Campbell Kennedy and died 9th February 1929, at East Kilbride.
- 1st Andrew Patton 17th June 1863 8th July 1864, East Kilbride.
- 2nd Andrew Patton 11th June 1865 22nd February 1866, Kirkton.
- Sarah Patton 5th November 1866 -17th January 1875.
- William Patton 26th August 1868 5th January 1875, died of Scarlatina.


