# PASTORAL LETTER



For the second year now, we've faced a strange start to the New Year. Restrictions have meant that things are just a bit different from usual, and again we're wondering what the year will hold. How will the virus situation be? Will our families and friends be alright? Again, it's an uncertain start to the year.

I recently had a conversation with one of our young people who is studying engineering at university. We were talking about that phenomenon where we describe people as being "glass half full" people, or "glass half empty" people. What we mean is that people are either optimistic, looking at their glass of life and seeing it has half full, or people are pessimistic, looking at their glass of life and seeing it as half empty. This young person said, "Or you could be an engineer or say that you've got the wrong size of glass!"

This set me thinking because I sometimes wonder if our expectations of life are about filling a large glass, a glass where everything is perfect, from our material goods to our appearance to our relationships, to our achievements. When we look at our lives as they really are, we all fall short and so we have to decide if our glass is half full or half empty, for none of us tick all the boxes in the perfect life.

But what if we, as Christians, don't go along with the size of glass the world dictates. What if we choose a different glass and say that the standards by which the world measures success are not our standards? What if we say we will measure ourselves by a different size of glass, a glass that is full with the love of God revealed to us in Jesus his son? What if we don't measure ourselves in the world's terms, but in Godly terms?

As we enter this New Year which is full of uncertainties again, let us not enter it with our glasses either half full or half empty. Let us enter it with a glass full. For we have a glass full of the love of God. We have a glass full of the promises of Jesus. "I will never leave you nor forsake you," says the Lord.

## COVID CHRISTMAS

Looking back on pieces I've written for the magazine over the past year I've realised just how many times I've suggested that we've "turned the corner" or "we're just about out of it"....silly me ! Well here we go again with the prospect of another Christmas of mask-wearing, social distancing and hand sanitising....is this the new "normal" ??

We had our arrangements for our services on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day all set up when yet more guidelines sent us back to the drawing-board and we hastily re-arranged things. Fortunately, one feature of our congregation that has been very evident over this year and the previous year, is our capacity to innovate and to quickly accept changes to our plans. By using Zoom and our Glebe Street hall we've been able to space out our services to make it easier to sanitise everything between services effectively. We have an experienced team of elders well-versed in managing the different mitigation measures to make services as safe as possible for our members and we will continue to cope with the ever-changing advice and requirements as we have for nearly two years now.

Even with this challenging background, the work of the Kirk Session has been continuing as we have turned our attention to the prospect of farreaching national changes affecting our own congregation. I've indicated earlier that there will be a reduction of the number of ministers in East Kilbride and this will lead to new arrangements for our ministry. The Kirk Session recently spent some time considering the likely effects of this reduction and has now submitted to Presbytery details of our vision of how this reduction might affect the Old Parish. Most of our members will know something of the history of the different churches in the village and will be aware that the West Kirk came about after a dispute in 1791 about the appointment of of a new minister with some members of the parish church congregation leaving to form a Relief Church only coming back to Church of Scotland in 1929. Our Kirk Session has the view that re-uniting with the West Kirk would be a sensible way to manage the reduction in minister numbers. We have started discussions about this with elders from the West Kirk but I'm sure members will realise that this will not be a quick process and that some very significant decisions such as ministry, buildings and finance will need to be faced. This will be a "long haul" !

Lastly, in this little piece, I would just like to remind our members of just how many people support the enormous range of activities that take place in and around our church. While some of the roles that people play are fairly visible, and folks can see the work they're doing, there are loads of people who just quietly work away in the background. Speaking personally, its only since I became Session Clerk that I've begun to get to know who actually sorts, arranges, changes, cleans, organises, tidies, prepares and manages the myriad of things that just "happen". To all of these volunteers faithfully working away on our behalf I express the most heartfelt appreciation and extend my wishes for a happy, healthy and peaceful Christmastime.

#### Sunday School

We had a very successful Christmas Party at which 17 children attended and we had fun, games. food and a visit from Santa. Thereafter we attended the Advent family service at which as well as taking part in the Nativity story we had some of the children and young people read the Bible lessons and light the advent candles during the service. It was also a great delight to witness Daisy, one of our new children, get baptised during the service. We then had a 2-week break and restarted on Sunday 9<sup>th</sup> January and we continue to meet every Sunday morning in the upper hall at 11am and all children and young people will be made most welcome. If you know of any child/children who would like to join us please invite them along.

The introduction of a new volunteer helpers rota will commence on 9<sup>th</sup> January. We managed to attract 10 people to get involved and many thanks to each of them. Based on that number working in 5 pairs, means that each pair will be on duty one Sunday in every 5 weeks – I am so very grateful to have this dedicated, wonderful group of people on board. This allows them to get involved in the Sunday School, working and engaging with our children whilst also having the opportunity to attend worship on a Sunday morning when they are not on duty. This new rota also allows all the leaders to be able to attend morning worship at least once a month.

I hope the congregation enjoyed looking at our window display in the Church during Advent which was a joint venture between the Sunday School & Art Group leaders and children entitled "Jesus is the light of the world".

### **Christingle Family Service**

Unfortunately, due to increased Government and Church of Scotland restrictions over the advent period we had to cancel the scheduled in-person Christingle service on Christmas Eve



and move it to a virtual on-line zoom service instead just as we did last year. We got the names of the children and families who wanted to join us and thanks to Christine & Gordon Tweedie (who made up the Christingle bags) we delivered them to the families in time for the on-line service to allow them to make up their own Christingle following the instructions and words from Anne at the appropriate time during the service. We also had appropriate Christingle advent hymns and a few well known sing a long Christmas tunes as well. We also had a short guest appearance from Santa (well it was his busiest night of the year after all!).

It wasn't what we wanted but it worked well with around 20 families and 30 children taking part and it allowed us to engage with children, young people and families at this most special time of the year,
