I saw two posters outside churches as I travelled from Paisley to East Kilbride during December and I thought I would share them with you – you may of course have seen them as well but as we move out of the advent season let's not forget the true and real significance of these words-

We took a risk and tried something a bit different this year for our all-age nativity service on the 4th Sunday in Advent on 22nd December. I hope you enjoyed what we did, and whilst it was different the central message remained the same –

It's was the celebration of the hope, peace, joy and love that came with the birth of Jesus. The angel declared the arrival of Emmanuel, meaning "God with us".

We did a hybrid Christmas experience of Messy Church and the all-age family nativity service rolled into one with an extra at the end of Santa's grotto.

We had a giant inflatable nativity scene outside in the courtyard, various arts, crafts and challenges stationed in the upper hall together with a reflection area where any one could write and post on our tree their hopes, dreams and wishes for the world or something local or for a person or situation known

personally to them this Christmas. We also had an opportunity to dress up as any of the nativity characters and get a selfie in front of the manger scene in the lounge or enjoy a hot drink and mince pie in our tea room in the lower hall provided and staffed by our Community Link team. We then performed our scratch nativity during the morning all age family service and finally gave all children the opportunity after the service to visit Santa in his grotto behind the pulpit and all children who visited Santa received a small gift.

We had around 30 children and young people join us for our Christmas experience, all of whom brought family and friends to join us, which was absolutely wonderful – most of whom don't come to church regularly, if at all, but join us at some point each month attending one of our children and/or family groups or activities. We have built strong relationships with many families and they always support and appreciate all that we do.

May I say how impressed I was with our six readers at the all-age nativity service – some of whom hadn't read in public before, were very apprehensive and nervous but they were magnificent and all did a great job.

There follows some photos from our service in this magazine for you to enjoy.

December always has and will continue to be a busy month – with weekly groups and many Christmas parties planning and preparing for the all-age service as well as the special services like the Christingle family service

It has been my pleasure and privilege to be able to work with all the children, young people and families all year round, sometimes seeing them three times a week, at our different groups and activities and I love seeing them enjoying what they do, becoming more confident and thriving young people. It makes what we do all so worthwhile.

Sunday School – Sunday 12th January at 11am in the Upper Hall

Messy Church – There is no session in January – our next session is on Sunday 2nd February from 2-4pm in the Glebe St Church Hall – the theme is Love.

THE CHURCH MAGAZINE

In January 1896 the first East Kilbride Parish Magazine was published and included the names and addresses of office bearers.

The Minister was The Rev^d William Jack M.A. and there were seven members of the Kirk Session:

Mr Christopher Strang, Shieldburn, Mr Stephen Young, Castleglen, Mr Charles Spalding, Maxwellton, Mr Patrick Graham, Kittochside, Mr James Millar, East Kilbride, Mr John Crawford, Crosshill, Mr Jasper T Thom, session-clerk.

The aim of the magazine was to increase the interest of the congregation in church life. The cost of the magazine was 1/- (5p) per year.

The magazines give a brief but informed insight into various aspects of church life including the church organisations, church finance and a lot of baptisms and marriages.

Of the names listed in the first magazine:

In 1893 the **Rev^d William Jack** was the first minister to be chosen by the congregation since Rev^d Robert Muir in 1688. Rev^d William Jack retired in 1932.

Mr Christopher Strang, farmer at Shieldburn, died 25th November 1899, aged 74 years. He was an elder for thirty five years. He and his family are buried in the Kirkyard.

Mr Stephen Young, Castleglen, a starch maker, died 26th September 1906, aged 76 years. He was an elder for twenty six years. He and his family are buried in the Kirkyard.

Mr Charles Spalding, Maxwellton, retired headmaster of Maxwellton Endowment School died 15th April 1906, aged 95 years having been elder at Errol and later East Kilbride Parish Church for 69 years. Four of his children are buried in the Kirkyard.

Mr Patrick Graham, farmer, 5th Laird of Kittochside, died 5th April 1916, aged 75 years. He and his family are buried in the Kirkyard.

Mr James Millar, Avondale House, East Kilbride, died 30th August 1903, aged 66 years. James was a merchant in wool manufacture. As well as elder he had been conductor of sacred music at East Kilbride Parish Church. The gold watch he received in 1877 when he retired is still with his family. He and his wife are buried in the Kirkyard,

Mr John Crawford was a farmer at Crosshill, Auldhouse. He retired to Broadlees, in Mearns three months before he died on 16th September 1916, aged 78 years. John Crawford was ordained to his office as elder on 19th September 1880. His first wife Janet Steven and infant daughter Isabella are buried in the Kirkyard.

Mr Jasper T Thom, session-clerk, died at St Andrews on 3rd July 1925. Mr Thom retired as headmaster of East Kilbride School and also as session clerk in 1918 a post he held from 1879. In those days if you were schoolmaster of the Parish school you were also session clerk.

By 1933 the Kirk Session came to the conclusion that instead of a monthly magazine, a supplement every two months (six per year), free of charge, would be sufficient. In December 1933 the Magazine's name was changed to The East Kilbride Old Parish Church Supplement published every second month.

By 1961, due to a large increase in the congregation brought about by the ever increasing new town, the Kirk Session had considered for some time that something had to be done to help bring people closer together to prevent loneliness and isolation. They decided to change the church supplement to a monthly magazine.

The first issue of "The EKO" appeared in October 1961. It was distributed monthly by volunteers in the town area and by post or special arrangement in the country area.

From July to September 1961 there were 11 baptisms, 14 weddings and in September alone there were 42 new members.

The EKO Magazine, now much more colourful and the content more varied, is still enjoyed today, It is thanks to the volunteers of the past and present who have edited and distributed the magazines that have made this possible. *Ref: Church Magazine Archives*


