Take Your Seat!

The church has now been open again for a few weeks and members have started to come back to Sunday worship. Numbers are still quite modest, and we've not had any problem seating everyone



wishing to come to a service, either in the church or the Glebe Street hall. Perhaps as more of us get our vaccinations and the weather gets a bit warmer more people might have the confidence to return to church.

Within the past couple of weeks there has been a slight relaxation of the rules for church services in that the limit of 50 worshippers has been discontinued, and from May onwards attendances will be limited only by the available space within the church. All the other restrictions however, including 2

metre social distancing, remain in place, so while our capacity will increase slightly, the change won't make any great difference in our case and guidelines for requesting a space will continue to be necessary pending more substantial relaxation of the rules.



We've given some thought to the fairest way to accommodate worshippers so until the rules relax even further, we plan to manage requests based on the following guidelines -

 Preference for seating in the church will be given to members who have not been to church recently; this may mean that some regular attenders will occasionally be allocated seats in the hall;

- To comply with Track & Trace, members are still required to give advance notice of a request to come to a service; information about "family groups" will be very helpful, especially with seating arrangements for Communion services;
- Members will be able to request to be added to the list for successive Sundays avoiding the necessity of contacting the church office early every week, but the office will need to be updated if anyone is not coming to <u>a particular service</u> as this then releases a seat for someone else;
- The list for church services will have a small number of seats unallocated to give the Duty Team discretion to accommodate members who may be unfamiliar with the requirement to give notice, or visitors perhaps on holiday or ex-members who have moved away;

The seating lists for services will be finalised around midday each Friday. Louise will **email** or **text** members to advise if they have a place at the Sunday service and whether in the church or hall. Members receiving emails might want to check their Junk or Spam folders if the message doesn't appear in their Inbox.

We now have a regular Duty Team, familiar with all the hygiene requirements, each Sunday at the church and hall and members should find this reassuring. We hope the arrangements we've developed doesn't look too bureaucratic or complicated, but the aim is to give everyone a fair opportunity of participating in a church service over the coming weeks and months.

These challenges are not new to our generation. In an article in Life and Work magazine, former moderator, Albert Bogle writes about one of the vows taken on ordination. It sticks in every minister's mind because the answer to the question is not "I do" but "they are." "*Are not zeal for the glory of God, love of the Lord Jesus Christ and a desire for the salvation of all, so far as you know your own heart, your great motives and chief inducements to enter into the office of the holy ministry?*" The archaic language reminds us of just how many people have answered "they are" to that question. As we come out of the restrictions and reshape what church looks like both nationally and locally, we are going to need that zeal. We are going to have to put our hands to the plough and not look back, but instead rekindle that zeal in one another as we step out in faith. In the words of Albert Bogle, "*We should stop talking about a "dying church" and instead speak of a living Saviour.*" I am confident that in East Kilbride Old, we are stepping into the future with confidence, speaking of our living Saviour.

Rev Walter Reid MA

60 years ago this month saw the induction of the Reverend Walter M Reid MA as minister of East Kilbride Old Parish Church, as successor to the Reverend T K Johnstone. A Social Meeting of the congregation was held in the Public Hall (now the Village Theatre) chaired by the Reverend John Logan of the West Kirk to welcome Mr Reid to the Church on 17th May 1961.



Walter Milne Reid was born in Glasgow in 1911. He was educated at Hutcheson's Boys Grammar School before going on to Glasgow University and Trinity College, graduating in 1932. He became the junior assistant in Springburn, then went to Battlefield East as assistant to the Reverend Dr George Dryburgh. His first charge was the Abbey Church in Dunbar where he stayed for five years before moving to Strathpeffer in Ross and Cromarty. While he was there, the minister of the neighbouring Fodderty Church retired and Mr Reid was asked to take on the linked charge of both churches. Five years later he moved to Crieff South Church where he stayed for nine years. During WW11 he was the supervisor for Huts and Canteens in East Lothian and Berwickshire, and he also did a vast amount of work with the canteen service in Yorkshire.

Following his induction to East Kilbride, he became active in Presbytery, serving on the Home Mission and Superintendence Committees. He was also greatly involved with the Mission to Lepers as chairman of the West of Scotland Committee, vice chair of Scottish Council and a member of the London Council. He oversaw the massive increase of members of our Church, as the New Town grew rapidly in size. He also oversaw the introduction of the EKO and the building of the Glebe Street Hall. Members of Session and their wives (no lady elders in these days) paid tribute to him on the occasion of the semi-jubilee of his ministry at a dinner held in the Torrance Hotel on 26th February 1963.

1974 saw the bi-centenary celebration of our Church, but sadly Mr Reid died on 29th May that year at the age of 62. His last public appearance was at the Anniversary Assembly to commemorate the bi-centenary on 13th March, which was held in the Ballerup Hall. A funeral service was held in the church on Saturday 1st June conducted by the Reverend J Lang, Moderator of Glasgow Presbytery together with the Very Reverend Andrew Herron, Clerk of the Presbytery. After a service at Strathpeffer the following week, the cortege moved to Fodderty Cemetery. On the following Sunday 9th June a Memorial Service was held in our Church when the service was conducted by the Reverend Dr John L Kent (father of our editor).

Christian Aid Week 2021



Christian Aid Week this year is from Monday 10th to Sunday 16th May. The start of the Week will be the focus of the Church Service on Sunday 9th May. Posters should be available to put up in the Lounge windows and 50 copies of a devotional booklet will be distributed to members of the congregation.

80 Lap Loch Walk. In addition, Stewart Smith and Jim Gray, both of whom turned 80 recently, are planning to do an 80 Lap Walk round the Heritage

Park Loch. The Walk will begin on 1st May and finish on 16th May, the last day of CA Week. They aim to walk 5 circuits per day, whatever the weather.

Members of the Congregation are invited to circulate the Walk details among family, friends, contacts etc, thereby encouraging support for Christian Aid from beyond the bounds of the Congregation.

The idea of walking round the loch has to do with the theme of this year's Christian Aid Week. The focus is on rural areas of Kenya, where due to climate change people are suffering as a result of drought. Women are building earth-dams, to collect what rainwater there is. There is also the added reminder that women often have to walk long distances every day to collect water for their families.

Christian Aid Boxes. If people have CA boxes at home, these can be returned on a Sunday, when people come to a service. Or they can be picked up from home. Please call Stewart or Mary Smith on 226718.

Climate Change. In November, COP26 is due to take place in Glasgow. COP stands for "Conference of Parties" – that is, the countries which signed the UN Climate Change accord in 1994. This is the 26th such conference. Climate Change and Climate Justice are central issues which Christian Aid is addressing, along with governments and agencies world-wide. Our own 'C of S' is participating through Eco-Congregation Scotland. Personal life-style choices are also important. What have we been up to during April? Well, we held our 5th monthly Sunday School Family Quiz night which attracted 8 teams made up of 26 individuals – a great effort. When the schools restarted after the Easter holidays our midweek Fling sessions ended. In total we had 15 midweek sessions which provided those who joined with the opportunity for a time to chill, meet and share news & gossip with their friends as well as having a lot of fun playing simple games, the Yes / No game was a particular favourite and one in which the young people excelled and always defeated the adults albeit with a little help from our resident question master & score keeper who shall remain anonymous!! We also undertook numerous art and craft projects, listened to music and watched short video clips. Thank you to all the adult leaders who gave up their time and considerable talent to help and encourage our children and young

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people & thanks also to the children and families who joined us every week in this successful new venture.

Our weekly virtual on-line sessions on a Sunday morning continue with a mixture of fun, games, a time to chat, puzzles, quizzes, go & fetch, music, keep fit, music as well as arts & crafts, Bible teaching and prayer. We have been providing this on-line version which is a mix between Sunday School & Messy Church for over a year now.

A successful Easter QR code trail in the Village area retelling the Easter story took place during Holy Week finishing on Easter Sunday in which people had to find 10 posters with Easter Eggs on them as well as a QR code which when scanned told them a part of the Easter story. During the morning service on Easter Sunday, 12 children and young people took part, albeit virtually, in the morning service recreating the story from Palm Sunday to Easter Day via a mix of drama & words. All the children and young people did really well and I hope you enjoyed watching and listening to their short video clips.

Finally, I am in the process of finalising not 1 but 2 Summer holiday clubs both running from Monday – Friday (inclusive) from 10-12am each day - one at the beginning of the holidays in early July (with an Olympic games / sports theme and is intended to be an outdoors event weather permitting!) and the other at the end of the holidays towards the end of August (more an indoor event with an arts & crafts theme). There are posters elsewhere in this magazine which provide the current provisional dates and more information on both of these clubs. The dates are currently still provisional because at the time of writing, neither the Scottish Government or Church of Scotland had given permission to allow such in person gatherings to take place. I am hopeful that the dates proposed will be the actual dates particularly as the restrictions are being relaxed.

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




