Partoral Letter



It was a delight to see the children in the church both on Harvest Thanksgiving and a couple of weeks later at their own prizegiving. We presented the children with bibles, and in my welcome to them, I asked them whether they watched the news on television, and it was no surprise when they replied that they didn't and when pressed further, their reason was that there was very little good news around. I'm sure we can all agree with them.

In Glasgow we are currently preparing for the COP26 conference on climate change, and we all know that action is urgently required there. I urge you to read the related articles in this magazine. It is the responsibility of us all to do whatever we can to reverse the effects of climate change. Our children are worried, we should be too.

Another area of increasing concern is the situation unfolding in Afghanistan. The withdrawal of troops has seen the country spin out of control, and the latest news article I saw included footage of parents trying to sell a child to buy food for their other children who were starving. It's unimaginable.

November is a time for remembrance, when we remember the sacrifice of people laying down their lives for the good of us all. When we look around the world this November, we must ask ourselves whether we are truly worthy of the sacrifice people made on our behalf. Do we see a world that they can be proud of? A world so full of bad news?

Well, here is the good news. The word "Gospel" literally means "Good News" and what we did on that prizegiving Sunday was to give each of the children connected to our church some good news. That good news is that God is still active in the world, and he is still making all things new. The good news is that God loves us and will never desert us, even in these times of trouble. In the midst of the difficulties in our world, Christians are still at the forefront of change and of hope. Above all, we are surrounding the world in prayer, and we know that prayer makes a difference.

Challenging Times



We have just about come to terms with the continuing restrictions that affect our involvement in the church including our morning services with compulsory facemasks and organisational activities without tea and biscuits. As we have all heard repeatedly from the pulpit, these rules are not of our making and we are simply using our discretion, and in the interests of everyone, to implement the requirements fairly and proportionately. We are well aware that other places including restaurants and night clubs, and indeed some churches, are operating differently but for the time being our Kirk Session is continuing to take a more cautious approach. Despite the restrictions, ever so gradually organisations and activities have resumed, and church life is starting to pick up again.

Over the past year and a half, the work of the Kirk Session has been focussed on local matters such as the induction of new elders; buildings maintenance, repair, and re-decoration; installation of audio-visual and security systems; installation of a new organ and management of church life within the legal and advisory constraints imposed by the pandemic.

The Kirk Session is now required to turn attention to much wider matters resulting from decisions taken by the church nationally to reduce the number of ministers across Scotland. In the case of East Kilbride, this will mean a reduction from 9 to 6 in the number of parish ministers. As a result, every congregation in the town will have to consider how it will fit in to a new structure involving possibilities such as union, linked charges, and team ministry. The Session will also need to consider the future of our church building and how it could be adapted to extend its presently limited use to a wider range of activities which might strengthen the case for it to be retained as being

being "essential" to our role within the community.

All this is happening at the same time as the amalgamation of Hamilton, Lanark and Falkirk Presbyteries into a single unit effective from 1 January 2022. As our church will become part of a much larger amalgamated presbytery this underlines the need for our Kirk Session to have a clear vision of what the future might look like for our congregations and others within the town.

These are really big, important issues for the Kirk Session to discuss as they will be pivotal in shaping our church and congregation for future generations. For many elders these issues may well be the most significant matters they will be involved in during their entire eldership.

Pilgrimage

On Tuesday 19th October Ian Stewart and I travelled into Glasgow to meet keen long distance walkers Bill and Christine Jack at Nelson's Column within Glasgow Green.

The purpose of our trip was to join Bill and Christine on the last leg of their 150 mile pilgrimage as this was the inaugural walk of "Kentigern Way" that the couple had set off to complete some 12 days previously.

This pilgrimage was a concept borne from a conversation Bill had 4 years ago with their then minister of Bothwell Parish Church Rev. Jim Gibson upon his return with parishioners from walking part of the Camino de Santiago de Compostela pilgrimage in Spain.

This conversation lit a fire within Bill and he and Christine began researching the life of Kentigern/ Mungo and established the link in Hoddom (Dumfries and Galloway) where Kentigern was gifted land and established an episcopal seat, both Bill and Christine plotted a route from Annan Old Parish Church to Glasgow Cathedral.

We were joined by other parishioners from various churches who had too come to wish them well. Prior to setting off prayer was led by Rev. David Whiteman minister of Annan Old Parish and it was fitting that he was present at the end of their pilgrimage as he was at their outset.

The weather was very kind to us as we set off on the short walk towards Glasgow Cathedral and Ian and I learnt that Bill's mother moved to East Kilbride in 1952 and most probably attended East Kilbride Old Parish Church.

Within no time at all we arrived at the Cathedral and Bill and Christine were met and welcomed by Rev. Mark Johnstone Cathedral minister.

Rev. Johnstone welcomed us all and called us to Worship on this dedication Service of "Kentigern Way"

The Lord Provost of Glasgow Philip Braat within his civic capacity offered his words of welcome to which Bill suitably replied and spoke of the Christian fellowship he and Christine encountered on their pilgrimage and the breathtaking Scottish lowland countryside they experienced in all its magnificent autumnal hues.

The reading was delivered by Robert Hynd Moderator of Glasgow Presbytery and the service was closed in prayer by Rev. Johnstone, we thereafter retired to the Upper Chapter House for refreshments and thereafter led by a marvellous and knowledgeable guide Bill and Christine completed their pilgrimage by arriving at the tomb of St. Mungo.

On our journey back to East Kilbride both Ian and I remarked that today was a fabulous day and we felt proud to be part, albeit in a very small way and prouder still to be representing East Kilbride Old Parish Church.

1st. Lord, guide our church elders in the work they do for our church.


2nd.Lord, be with all those in Afghanistan without homes and food. Give them hope.
