PASTORAL LETTER

This time last week, the temperature in East Kilbride was 23 degrees, and I was complaining about the heat. Today the temperature when I went out this morning was 6 degrees, so now I'm complaining about the cold. There is no doubt that after a pretty poor summer, and a couple of nice days last week, that we're most definitely in the season of Autumn. When I went on holiday a couple of weeks ago, the tree outside the study window was green, now it's orange. We better get our winter woollies looked out, for as the old saying goes, there's no such thing as bad weather, just the wrong clothing.

As we continue with the routine of our church life together, there's something reassuring about the familiarity of it all. We have our communion at the start of October, then we're into Harvest season, and already we're beginning to prepare for the Remembrance services at the memorial and in the church. I hate to mention it, but after that we're into Advent then Christmas. It's familiar, it's reassuring and it's comforting.

Yet, as we get back into the old routine, there are also serious conversations going on about our proposed union with neighbouring churches. Folks, this is a reality we have to face. HISTORY CORNER



Graham of Lymekilns

A beautifully preserved inseription on a flat stone reads: "Here lies the corpse of Patrick Graham of Limekills and Margaret Lindsay his spouse and is

the place appointed for William Graham and Jean Reid his spouse and their children 1753". (Limekills original spelling)



The baptism of Patrick Graham is reported to have been

registered on 3rdJune 1658, at Glasgow, but the names of his parents are not recorded. He became a merchant in Kirktoun of Kilbryde, 1st Laird of Lymekilns and married Margaret Lindsay, on 3rd June 1684 at Kilbryde. James Chrichton, Minister of the Kirk of Kilbryde solemnized their marriage.

Margaret Lindsay, 10th September 1663 – 7th November 1733, was the daughter

of William Lindsay of Holmbarn and Caldersyd and Janet Cunningham. She was the great grand-daughter of Elizabeth Stewart of Castlemilk, great, great, grand —daughter of Sir Archibald Stewart of Castlemilk and Sir John Stewart of Minto who was Provost of Glasgow. Margaret is also descended from the Hamilton's of Piell and Torrance. Patrick and Margaret had nine children:

- Janet, born 11th March 1685, married James Fleming, coppersmith in Hamilton.
- Jean, born 16th July 1687, married James Coats of Dykehead son of James
 Coats of Dykehead and Jean McGhie. Their family is buried in the Kirkyard.
- ♦ James born 25th July 1690.
- Margaret, born 29th August 1692, married John Fleming of Blacklaw.
- ♦ Anne born 1694.
- William, 2nd Laird of Lymekilns, e1697 1780, married before December

- William, 2nd Laird of Lymekilns, e1697 1780, married before December 1721 Jean Reid, e1704 8th July 1741, the daughter of John Reid of Kittochside and Jonet Warnock.
- Marion, born 22nd May 1700, married James Strang of Westhouse.
 Their family is buried in the Kirkyard.
- Patrick born 11th February 1702.
- Mary born e1705. Her baptism was registered at Kilbride on 13th May
 1705. Mary married Robert Falconer, wright in Glasgow.

William's son Patrick Graham 3rd Laird of Lymekilns (Ist December 1721 – 5th March 1792) married on 18th November 1759 Margaret Urie born 11th April 1731, at Govan, the daughter of Alexander Urie of Holmhead and Margaret Barns daughter of Robert Barns of Kirkhill. Margaret died in 1801. It is through this marriage that the Barns name came into the Graham family.

The Lairds of Lymekilns would become senior Heritors in the parish. In 1860, a new house called Auburn Cottage, at 11 Eaglesham Road, was built for the schoolmaster.

Patrick Barns-Graham gifted the site.

In January 1920, Allan Barns-Graham gifted two aeres of his estate as a site for the new War Memorial which was unveiled in April 1921.
