## **Pastoral Letter**



There is a story of an old monk who prayed many years for a vision from God to strengthen his faith, but it never came. He had almost given up hope when, one day, a vision appeared. The old monk was overjoyed. But then, right in the middle of the vision, the monastery bell rang. The ringing of the bell meant that it was time to feed the poor who gathered daily at the monastery gate. And it was the old monk's turn to feed them. If he failed to show up with food, the poor people would leave quietly, thinking the monastery had nothing to give them that day.

The old monk was torn between his earthly duty and his heavenly vision. However, before the bell stopped tolling, the monk had made his decision. With a heavy heart, he turned his back on the vision and went off to feed the poor. Nearly an hour later, the old monk returned to his room. When he opened the door, he could hardly believe his eyes. There in the room was the vision waiting for him. As the monk dropped to his knees in thanksgiving, the vision said to him, "My son, had you not gone off to feed the poor, I would not have stayed.

The best way to serve God is to reach out in service to our brothers and sisters, especially those with less than we have. Harvest Thanksgiving is an important point in the Christian Year. How often do we grumble about what we don't have, rather than give thanks for what we do have? We're all guilty of it. Our world is a troubled place at this time, and while we sit in our warm houses, eat our abundance of food, watch the horrors other people are experiencing as the images appear on our television screens before we sleep in security, we must remind ourselves of those who do not spend their days as we do, and importantly, give all we can to help, and remember them in our prayers.

A Celtic Rune of Hospitality says:

"We saw a stranger yesterday. We put food in the eating place, drink in the drinking place, music in the listening place and in the sacred name of the triune God He blessed us and our house, our cattle and our dear ones. As the lark says in her song: Often, often, often goes Christ in the stranger's guise."

# **Harvest Thanksgiving**

Harvest Sunday will be on 12<sup>th</sup> October. In gratitude for our own harvests, we will support two groups with our Harvest Appeal, one at home and the other abroad.

Glasgow City Mission has three main projects. In winter, they support rough sleepers. In their Centre, they help people affected by poverty and homelessness. In Govan they run a Child and Family Centre.

Christian Aid has a Harvest of Hope Appeal, which this year is for Sierra Leone. Climate Change is threatening food security. Unpredictable rainfall causes devastating floods that wash away crops, start landslides and destroy roads to market. In the dry season, scorching heat triggers drought that withers plants. Christian Aid has established a Village Savings and Loan Association to give help to the women who make up some 70% of Sierra Leone's agricultural labour force.

What is Fairtrade?

Fairtrade is an ethical way of trading for farmers and workers in the developing world

Fairtrade helps build a fairer world.

Fairtrade ensures that farmers and workers have

- better working conditions and pay
- a fair price for their produce
- a Fairtrade Premium extra money to invest in community projects such as health clinics, schools and clean water
- workers' rights, such as safer working conditions, equality of opportunity for men and women, and a ban on child labour.



The Fairtrade Mark ensures that Fairtrade produce meets high economic and environmental standards.

Fairtrade encourages responsible land use and less use of pesticides to promote a healthier planet.

Scotland is a Fairtrade nation.

Local supermarkets in East Kilbride, eg, the Co-op, M&S and Lidl, stock Fairtrade items, such as coffee, tea, bananas, ice cream, flowers, chocolate and wine.

The Old Parish Church is a Fairtrade Church. The EK Fairtrade Group recently had a stall at South Lanarkshire College Freshers Week. We talked to students and staff and handed out Fairtrade leaflets and chocolate.

Fairtrade helps build a fairer world and is good for the environment. It makes sense to support Fairtrade and to buy Fairtrade items when shopping in supermarkets. Anne Daniels



#### **History Corner**

#### More Christian Signs and Symbols

As we come to the front door of the Church on a Sunday morning, we pass the vestry windows. The vestry was built as a First World War Memorial, with the names of the Fallen inscribed under an arch above the windows. A plaque at the side records the names of those lost in World War Two.





Carved in stone right at the top, above the arch, and below the stone Cross (carved three-dimensionally) are two ancient Christian symbols.

pha and Omega. These are the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet. (Incidentally, the word alphabet is simp-

ly the first two Greek letters – alpha and beta). Greek has two letters for our "o". Omega gives the "o" sound as in "home"; omicron gives the "o" sound as in "hot". You have to look carefully, because the carver has intertwined the two letters and given them some artistic curves and scrolls.

In the last book of the New Testament, Revelation, the writer imagines the Risen Lord as saying, "I am the Alpha and Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end". Ever since, these two letters have been used in Christian art to remind us of our faith in God's love revealed in Jesus Christ. The German pastor, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, who was executed by the Nazis for his part in the resistance

to Hitler, knew that faith. His last words, spoken to a fellow prisoner before he was led out to the gallows, were "This is the end – for me, the beginning of life".

Below the Alpha and Omega is what is called the Chi-Rho sign. Again, this is made up of two Greek letters. The first looks like our "X", and the other looks like our "P", the one linked with the other. In fact, the "X" is the Greek letter "Chi", which gives our "ch" sound, as in "loch" and what looks like a "P" is the Greek letter "Rho", which is our "R" sound. These letters in Greek are the first two letters of the Greek word "Christos" –our word "Christ". Like the Alpha and Omega, the Chi-Rho sign has been in use for almost two thousand years.

So, even before we enter the Church itself, we can look up and be reminded of the great central truths of Christian faith – carved in stone, yes, but also alive in our hearts and lives.
