John Hunter of Calderfield & Family



In the kirkyard at Lair 170 the inscription on the flat stone reads:

" 1751 This is the Burial Place of **John Hunter** Of Calderfield And **Agnes Paul** his Spouse".

John Hunter of Calderfield,1663 – 30<sup>th</sup> October 1741, married in Glasgow, on the 30<sup>th</sup> December 1707, Agnes Paul c1685 - 3<sup>rd</sup> November 1751, daughter of John Paul, Maltman in Glasgow, burgess and guild brother and at some point Treasurer of the City of Glasgow.

John Hunter was a portioner of Long Calderwood, farmer and merchant. The old Kirk Session minutes record that in 1720 he was keeper of the Mortcloths. At a funeral, the Mortcloth was a ceremonial cloth used to cover the coffin. Most families did not have their own and hired them from the Kirk Session. The money the Kirk Session received was used to assist the poor of the parish.

On 25<sup>th</sup> September 1729, John was enrolled as a burgess and guild brother of Glasgow.

John Hunter and Agnes Paul had ten children at least four are likely to be buried in the kirkyard:

John 5<sup>th</sup> October 1708 - 1722, aged 14 years.

Elizabeth 18th February 1710 - 12th September 1711.

Andrew 4<sup>th</sup> October 1711 - died 18<sup>th</sup> May 1714.

Isabel 1725 -1742.

Janet, 10<sup>th</sup> March 1713 – 1749, married Mr Buchanan, cabinet maker, Glasgow. physician to Queen Charlotte. On the death of his brother James, he inherited Long Calderwood. William did not marry and left his extensive collection of books, coins and works of art to Glasgow University which resulted in the opening of the Hunterian Museum.

He was buried at St James's, Piccadilly.

John, 13<sup>th</sup> February 1728 - 16<sup>th</sup> October 1793, studied anatomy with his brother William. He became a distinguished surgeon and was appointed surgeon extraordinary to King George III. In July 1771 John married Anne Hunter,13<sup>th</sup> March 1742 – 7<sup>th</sup> January 1821. She was the eldest daughter of army surgeon Robert Boyne Home of Greenlaw Castle, Berwickshire.

Anne was a noted lyrical poetess "The Flower of the Forest" appeared in the Edinburgh periodical called The Lark. Thirty two years later she wrote "Sports of the Genii" to a set of graceful drawings by Susan McDonald. She published a volume of poems in 1802 which ran to a second edition. She is mostly remembered for text to at least nine of Joseph Haydn's fourteen songs in English. Her social literary parties were popular in Georgian London.

- Dorothea, 26<sup>th</sup> January 1721 29<sup>th</sup> September 1806, married the Reverend James Baillie 1722 – 1778 who became Professor of Divinity at Glasgow University. Two of their four children became historical figures:
- Joanna Baillie, 11<sup>th</sup> September 1762 23<sup>rd</sup> February1851, became a poet and dramatist who was known for her works on the Passions (three volumes) and Fugitive Verses. Sir Walter Scott called her "the fair Joanna." On the death of her father the family moved to Long Calderwood before moving to Hampstead. She did not marry.
- Dr Matthew Baillie 27<sup>th</sup> October 1761 23<sup>rd</sup> October 1823 was Joanna's brother. He was educated at The Old Grammar School renamed Hamilton Academy.
  - Graduated from Glasgow and Oxford Universities. He taught anatomy and was appointed physician at St George's Hospital and became physician to King George III.
  - He married Sophia Denman, sister of Thomas Denman 1<sup>st</sup> Baron Denman. William Baillie died of tuberculosis in 1823. He was buried in Duntisbourne Abbots, Gloucestershire. There is also a memorial

to him within Westminster Abbey.

In the mid- nineteenth century his son William Hunter Baillie, 4, Upper Harley Street, London, was listed as one of East Kilbride's landowners. *Ref:*


